Good morning to you all. Sanibonani. Molweni

Today, we gather to celebrate the 10th Africa Day during Africa Month, a significant occasion that coincides with South Africa's observance of 30 years of democracy.

This year's theme, "Celebrating 30 Years of Freedom: Building a Better Africa and a Better World," resonates deeply with our collective journey and aspirations as a continent.

We also gather here in this town of Kokstad in remembrance of our departed Paralympian Zanele Situ who passed on in November last year.

Driving in through Kokstad, I have been very impressed with the rapid development of the town. The N2/R56 Interchange is a game changer for



the town in terms of economy, tourism and logistics even after the N2 has been diverted from passing through this beautiful town.

We are proud of the ANC government that has prioritised infrastructure development to enable job creation, economic growth and skills transfers through building of road infrastructure like the one I have just observed. As former Premier Ambassador Sbu Ndebele once eloquently opined that: "It's the roads that build economy and not the economy that builds roads" Speaking of infrastructure, since the 2010 FIFA World Cup our Government continues to build and upgrade world class stadiums to serve professional and amateur sport. These include the iconic Moses Mabhida Stadium, Sugar Ray Xulu Stadium, King Zwelithini Stadium, Princess Magogo Stadium, Harry Gwala Stadium, Msunduzi Athletics Stadium, KwaMsane Sports Complex, Ndumo Sport Complex.

Just a few hours ago we have just opened to the public the Shayamoya Library in Ward 4. This R37,7 million facility is one of our biggest libraries and it joins a host of others that we ave built across the province.

Over 100 libraries have been built in KwaZulu-Natal since the dawn of democracy to increase access to education opportunities. Free wi-fi connection is available at 164 public libraries and 38 mini-libraries for the blind have been established across the Province.

For this Shyamoya Library, 27 local community members have benefitted in this project including the local suppliers that were utilised on the project. They also received training/skills that they will use even after this project which will assist them to support their families.

During the construction period of the project the employment of local labour was intensified to achieve the objective of poverty alleviation within the area and as three (3) wards benefitted from the development of the project. The development will improve the culture of learning through the services that will be provided by library when it is operational and that include the circulation of books, free internet, gaming for kids and many other amenities.

This is the second library were are opening in the local municipality following the opening of Franklin Modular Library in December 2022. We build libraries because of our love of books and what they mean to our world. **Africa today need more book than ever!** This is the same inspiration and discipline with the books that we should inculcate into our children and young people.

We are building libraries like these with the aim of preserving not only the knowledge and the information, but to empower the future generations that come after us. This is part of Vision 2063 of a reading AFRICA!

These are the legacies we need to leave to our children — *imitapo yolwazi* eyifa elingasoze labuna! To quote **Isithwalandwe uBaba u-Oliver Tambo** when he said: "The children of any nation are its future. A Country, a movement, a person that does not value its youth and children does not deserve it future,"

Books are the foundation of many of our institutions. They are what one author called our **'fixed capital,'** more vital than any professor, any classroom, or laboratory.

When I was growing up I often would hear those ahead of me, especially the wise elderly, saying: "imfundo ayikhulelwa" or "ufunda uze ufe" colloquially meaning that "you are never too old to learn."

A library is therefore a repository for the whole of human knowledge, and we must safeguard it for future generations. It is ours to protect and to preserve. Ngiyanxusa futhi ngiyacela ukuba lomtapo wolwazi (library) niwuphathise kuhle kwezikhali zamantungwa. Niwuvikele from being vandalised.
